REGULATORY FRAMEWORK

- New tariffs became effective as of February 16, 2024, which reestablished the economic equilibrium of the Company as reflected in the Independent Auditors' opinion.
- **The National Government is studying possible changes to the subsidy program.**

- ❖ The Five-Year Tariff Review process (2025-2029) is continuing and expected to be completed as originally planned by year-end 2024.
- ❖ Resolution 58/2024 (and modification) CAMMESA payment plan: The Secretary of Energy instructed CAMMESA to determine the amounts owed by distribution companies related to energy purchases from the wholesale market and the form by which these amounts due should be paid.

03 FINANCIAL RESULTS



Results showed a significant improvement YoY, primarily reflecting the February 16, 2024 increase in the VAD of 319.2%.

Edenor increased the level of investments in 1Q24 (+27% vs. 1Q23).

Revenues: Rose to 2% YoY in constant currency to ARS 276,157 million in 1Q24. This was mainly due to the record high temperatures registered in the first quarter of 2023 and consequently lower demand in 1Q14 which was compensated by the tariff increase obtained as of February 16, 2024.

The number of clients amounted to 3.3 million in 1Q24 (+1% vs 1Q23).

Energy Purchases: The cost of energy purchases declined a sharp 18% vs. 1Q23 to ARS 160,419 million, which reflected (1) the lower demand mentioned earlier, particularly from residential customers and (2) an increase in energy costs as billed to consumers from February 1 because of the government's efforts to reduce energy subsidies.

Distribution Margin: Increased significantly to ARS 115,738 million in the first quarter of 2024, up 54% vs. 1Q23, mainly due to positive effects from both the tariff adjustment in place from mid-February 2024 and lower volumes, which offset the effect of net higher energy costs due to reduced subsidies.

Net Financial Results: It recorded a loss of ARS 214,050 million in 1Q24 (+58% vs 1Q23) mainly due to the higher financial debt assumed in the period.

Net Results: Net profit of ARS 50,867 million was obtained in 1Q24 vs. last year's loss in 1Q23 of ARS 38,639 million. The improvement was due to the better operating results.

Investments: In 1Q24, ARS 49,088 million was invested, (+27% vs 1Q23). Continued strong investments underline our unwavering commitment to improving service quality, which is evident in the strong improvements that have been achieved in our Operating Indicators.

First quarter 2024, energy sales volumes declined 7.8% vs. the prior to 5,981 GWh, mainly led by an 11.1% drop in Residential Customers consumption, as a result of having registered record higher temperatures in the first quarter 2023 as well as the adjustment in the price of energy and the VAD sinse February 16, 2024.

Edenor's customer base reached 3.3 million customers (+1% vs 1Q23), due mainly to an increase in residential and industrial customers. These increases reflected greater market discipline measures and the installation of 1,406 energy meters in the first quarter 2024, which were intended to convert clandestine connections into formal participants in the electricity system.

Excluding provisions for fines, operating expenses were in line with the prior period.

The rise in operating expenses can be attributed mainly to provisions for penalties assessed by the regulator (ENRE) to update these for the effect of tariff adjustments put in place during the first quarter of 2024. In other expense categories, although an increase in salaries and social charges in 1Q24 was recorded, it was offset by the reduction in fees and remuneration for services.

At the end of March 2024, collectability was 93.90%, resulting in a period-end accrued bad debt of ARS 11,906 million.

- ❖ First quarter EBITDA was a positive result of ARS 4.396 million, a sharp swing from the same period of last year's loss of ARS 20.079 million.
- * The main factors driving the improvement were the following:
 - Positive impacts higher revenues in the last month and a half that resulted from the tariff adjustment (implemented 02/16/2024).
 - Further reduction in energy losses (15,9% in 1Q23 VS 14,5% in 1Q24).

The investment plan executed in recent years continues to show results that are reflected in a continuous improvement in the service quality, by reducing the duration and frequency of outages since 2014, and thus exceeding the established regulatory requirements.

Quality standards are measured based on the duration and frequency of service outages using SAIDI and SAIFI indicators.

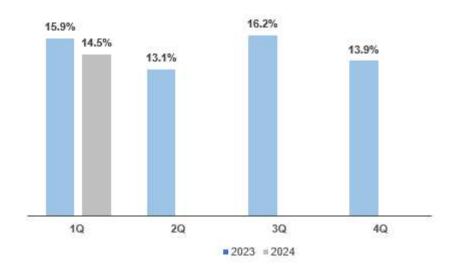


At the closing of the first quarter of 2024, the SAIDI and SAIFI indicators showed 8.6 hours and 3.5 average outages per client in the period, both at record lows and registering improvements of 74% and 63%, respectively, compared to 2014.

This recovery in service is mainly due to the strong investments that the Company has made over the last decade. These investments have been focused on implementing improvements in operational processes and the adoption of technology applied to the operation and management of the network.

ENERGY LOSSES





In 1Q24, energy losses declined to 14.5% compared to 15.9% in the same period of the previous year.

Driving Innovation and Efficiency in Loss Mitigation:

Our dynamic multidisciplinary teams remain steadfastly dedicated to pioneering novel solutions in the battle against energy losses. This collaborative effort has been further fortified by the resolute execution of Market Discipline (DIME) initiatives, aimed at curtailing losses.

Leveraging the potency of analytical and artificial intelligence tools, we have strategically optimized inspection routes, augmenting their efficacy. The mission of DIME actions remains resolute: identifying and rectifying irregular connections, thwarting fraud, and curbing energy pilferage.

Measurable Strides in Inspection and Detection:

From January to March 2024, a substantial total of 60,749 inspections were conducted on Tariff 1 (Residential and General users), which showed an efficiency rate of 48.3%. This stands in comparison to the same period in the prior year when 79,483 inspections yielded a higher efficiency rate of 50.2%.

In addition, the installation of 1,406 Integrated Energy Meters (MIDE) during first quarter 2024 attests to our commitment to modernizing energy monitoring mechanisms.

Recovery Initiatives and Redefining Balance:

Our endeavors extend beyond detection as we diligently restore energy integrity. Beyond the normalization of MIDE meter-equipped customers, our reach extends to clandestine customers with conventional meters.

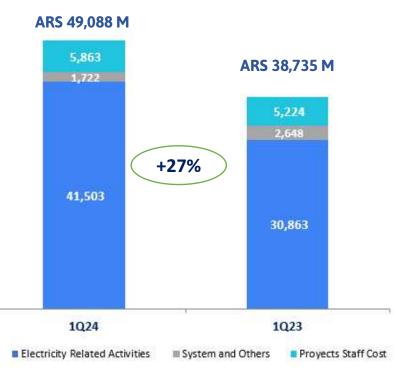
Augmenting these efforts, a novel energy balance system has been meticulously implemented, complemented by the advent of microbalances in private neighborhoods. Despite our tenacious endeavors, there have been cases of repeat fraud in many client groups.

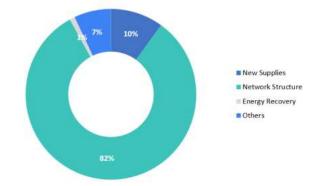

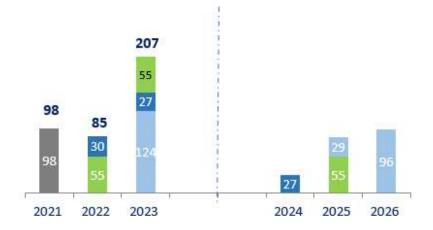

Through a concession, edenor distributes electricity exclusively in the northwest of Greater Buenos Aires and in the northern area of the City of Buenos Aires, to 3.3 million customers (a population of approximately 9 million inhabitants) in an area of 4,637 square kilometers. In 1Q24, edenor sold 5,981 GWh of electricity and purchased 7,004 GWh (including demand from the toll system), registering revenues for 1Q23 of ARS 276,157 million. Net earnings for the first quarter 2024 were a profit of ARS 50,867 million.
